Across the Atlantic:

American Impressionism through the French Lens

September 8, 2018 – January 20, 2019



This extraordinary exhibition, drawn mostly from the collection of the Reading Public Museum, explores the path to Impressionism through the nineteenth century in France. The show examines the sometimes complex relationship between French Impressionism of the 1870s and 80s and the American interpretation of the style in the decades that followed.

More than sixty-five paintings and works on paper help tell the story of the "new style" of painting which developed at the end of the nineteenth century—one that emphasized light and atmospheric conditions, rapid or loose brushstrokes, and a focus on brightly colored scenes from everyday life, including both urban and rural settings. The artists began to paint outdoors and capture the different effects of light during different times of day and seasons of the year.

Across the Atlantic will also feature works by artists whose paintings helped pave the pathway to Impressionism such as members of the Barbizon School including Jean-Baptiste-Camille Corot and Narcisse Diaz de la Peña. Other French painters whose techniques and subjects paralleled those of the Impressionists like Charles-François Daubigny, Leon-Augustin Lhermitte, and Jean-Charles Cazin will also be examined. Many of these artists practiced painting outdoors, en plein air, a new freedom that the commercial availability of tubed paint and portable easels afforded them.

Some of the artists featured in the exhibition in Reading include Claude Monet — which will be the first time his work is displayed in Berks County! — Edgar Degas, Mary Cassatt, and Victor Vignon, among others, who exhibited in the official Impressionist exhibitions in Paris in the 1870s and 80s. Although familiar and beloved by modern audiences, in their own time, the Impressionists were thought of as a rather radical alternative to the traditions of academic painting. The progressive group of artists eschewed the official, state-funded Salon in Paris and instead decided to exhibit their works in unconventional displays.

Among the earliest American artists to embrace the style were John Singer Sargent, William Merritt Chase, John Henry Twachtman, Willard Metcalf, Childe Hassam, and Frank W. Benson, among others, whose works are included in the current exhibition.

American collectors and taste-makers were among the first to begin collecting Impressionists paintings. By the 19-teens, the Reading Public Museum was collecting works by American Impressionists, a genre that would later become one of its greatest strengths.

A host of American artists, many of whom traveled to France around the turn of the century to continue their studies in fine art, embraced the style including: Daniel Garber, Edward Redfield, Robert Spencer, Arthur Watson Sparks, Robert Lewis Reid, William Paxton, Chauncey Ryder, Frederick John Mulhaupt, and Guy Wiggins, are highlighted.

After its debut in Reading, Across the Atlantic will travel on a national tour to venues throughout the United States including: the Louisiana State University Museum of Art in Baton Rouge, Louisiana; The Polk Museum of Art in Lakeland, Florida; the Appleton Museum of Art at the College of Central Florida in Ocala, Florida; the Cedar Rapids Museum of Art in Cedar Rapids, lowa; and the Art Museum of South Texas in Corpus Christi, Texas. The touring sponsor for the exhibition is Pook & Pook, Inc.

RPM's Collection is Expanding

The Museum's permanent collection is ever expanding thanks to generous gifts made by donors year-round. Donations come from near and far, and occasionally two previously unrelated works of art will present a shared commonality beyond the Reading Public Museum becoming their new home. Works by abstract artists Larry Poons (b. 1937) and Peter Reginato (b. 1945) entered the collection this spring, and have a connection outside Berks County – both artists currently live and work in New York City, and teach at The Art Students League of New York.

The Art Students League has, for over 130 years, offered art classes for both professional artists and amateurs in Manhattan. The League has counted among its attendees and instructors many historically important artists who have made

contributions to major artistic movements and schools in the art world. Larry Poons and Peter Reginato join the list of artists in The Museum's collection who have acted as teachers at The League over the course of its history, including: George Bellows, Raphael Soyer, John Henry Twachtman, J. Alden Weir, William Merritt Chase, Childe Hassam, and Hans Hofmann, among others.

Luther W. Brady, M.D. has made The Museum the recipient of *Momentum*, a colossal 256" (21.3") long painting by Larry Poons. The painting was the namesake for a 2017 exhibition of 12 of the artist's recent and historically important works at Yares Art in New York. The painting will be transported on a large roll from New York City to Reading where it will be restretched and hung in the Cohen Gallery of Modern and Contemporary Art.

New donors to The Museum, Seth and Lynn Abraham, in memory of Fay and Mayer Rubenstein, have donated an abstract steel outdoor sculpture, *Untitled*, by Peter Reginato. This early work (1970), was part of a group of sculptures that earned Reginato his first major gallery exhibition in New York City in 1971. The sculpture has been placed on a pad on the south side of Wyomissing Creek, near the red bridge before Trudy's Garden.

Keep an eye out for these works by notable Art Students League instructors in The Museum and Arboretum in the coming months as we eagerly welcome them to Reading.

Sign of the Times: The Great American Political Poster, 1844 – 2012

September 1, 2018 - January 19, 2019


Historically, the American political poster has been sorely neglected as an art form and has played a minor cultural role, despite its effectiveness in conveying a political message to millions of voters often through the skillful use of visual communication. Sign of the Times, which features 50 posters from the nineteenth through the twenty-first century, has made every effort to bring the alluring, eye-popping political graphics to the forefront and positions the "great American political poster" as art.

The political campaign poster had its humble beginnings in the 1840s when the new lithographic printing process, largely developed in Germany, was employed to satisfy a growing demand for attractive printed material. Hand-colored portraits of presidential and vice-presidential candidates were first produced for the 1844 race between Whig Party candidate Henry Clay and the eventual winner, James K. Polk of the Democratic Party. Technological innovation and the lithographic process in the 1880s ushered in a golden age of lithography, roughly 1890-1912, which produced some of the most intricate and colorful posters in the exhibition. The exhibition examines the styles of political posters through two World Wars and into the mid-century. The influence of the counter-culture of the 1960s and 70s, and more recent trends into the twenty-first century are also explored.

The exhibition was organized as a Program of ExhibitsUSA, a national division of the Mid-America Arts Alliance and The National Endowment for the Arts.

Meet Me at The Museum

Say hello to Anne Mumma, a Reading School District 5th Grade Teacher at 13th and Green Elementary. Anne is a supporter of The Museum and brings her students on a school field trip every year with the assistance of our *Feed Their Imagination Program* (FTI).

Our FTI program helps schools in need of funds to bring students to The Museum — thanks to the community! We had a conversation with Anne about the importance of hands-on learning in education.

How long have you been an educator?

I have been in the field of education for twelve-and-a-half years and have been with the Reading School District for ten-and-a-half years.

Why is it important for students to have hands-on experiences?

It is extremely important for all students to go out and have hands-on experiences. It is especially relevant to students that are kinesthetic learners or English language learners to make those essential connections to learning and subjects they may have learned about in class, and then to be able to put those concepts into real life contexts.



Why do you enjoy bringing students to The Museum?

I love bringing the students to The Museum because they really enjoy it. It is wonderful to see them interested and engaged in learning new things and asking questions while making connections to things they have already learned. The experience of being able to ask questions and explore the ideas more in depth is really beneficial to their educational experience.

What are the benefits of schools in need using FTI funding?

The FTI funding has been an excellent program offered to me as a teacher that facilitates this trip for 5th graders annually on behalf of 13th and Green Elementary. It is fantastic to be able to offer the same experience to all of the students regardless of their ability to cover the cost financially. It also allows the school to put the money they would have used for transportation and admission towards another potential experience or program for our students.

Do you recall a certain student being moved or excited by something at The Museum?

I have had so many students over the years that have become very interested in a certain topic (like mummies or fossils) after visiting The Museum. Most students in general really find the Planetarium to be exciting and interesting which leads them to explore their curiosity about space and astronomy.


More about Feed Their Imagination

Across the Atlantic: American Impressionism through the French Lens is a tremendous exhibition of artwork, mainly drawn from our collection, which has been several years in

the making. As most of our American Impressionism has been traveling to other institutions since *The Lure of the Artists' Colony* back in 2011, this is a chance to bring it back to Berks and pair it with some French works that helped inspire their American counterparts. We've been adding French Impressionism to the collection in advance of this show, and some old favorites like our famous works by Edgar Degas will also be on display. Perhaps the most exciting feature, however, will be a work on loan from the Denver Art Museum — Claude Monet's *Path in the Wheat Fields at Pourville (Chemin dans les blés à Pourville)* — which will mark the first time his work has been displayed in Berks County. The exhibition will debut during our "Night at The Museum" party on September 8.

Opening just a couple of weeks after Across the Atlantic will be **Dinosaurs in Motion**, an interactive recreation of fossilized dinosaur skeletons that combines science, technology, engineering, art, and mathematics, or S.T.E.A.M. as it is known in the education world. This exhibition is certain to delight our visitors of all ages as they use simple

machines to manipulate the "skeletons" and see science at work through the exposed machinery that makes it happen. Opening just in time for the fall field trip season for our school visitors, this exhibition will continue our history of educating about the planet's biggest and most fascinating extinction story.
