Recent Acquisitions: Building The Collection

January 28 – May 14, 2023

The more than thirty works included in this wide-ranging exhibition explore a variety of media including painting, pastel, prints, photographs, sculpture and decorative arts that have been added to the growing collection over the past eight years. The exhibition demonstrates the vitality and broad scope of RPM's Permanent Collection. Thanks to the generosity of many donors — through both gifts and bequests — combined with strategic purchases, the collection has been enriched for future generations.

The exhibition includes works by Abbott Thayer, Jane Peterson, Arrah Lee Gaul, Reginald Marsh, Alexander Calder, Chaim Gross, Norman Rockwell, Henry Moore, Louise Nevelson, Paul Jenkins, John Hultberg, Robert Indiana, George Segal, Arthur H. Smith, Peter Paone, Eileen Goodman, Bill Scott, Bernard Brenner, Gary Erbe, and Tim Barr, among others.

An outstanding group of paintings and works on paper by both American and European artists will be on view. Many of the works represent the first examples by the artists to enter the collection and are welcome additions, helping to round out RPM's holdings. In addition to historical and more modern artworks, the display will also include the decorative arts featuring historical examples of Wedgwood jasperware, Daum Nancy, WMF (Wüttembergische Metallwarenfabrik), and Roseville Pottery, among others. Sculpture will also be represented in the show with examples in bronze, brass, wood and resin from the late-nineteenth through the late-twentieth century.

Great Museums of Europe Art History Short Course

This engaging Art History Short Course will explore the ‘Great Museums of Europe’ in a four-part series led by RPM curator Scott Schweigert.

Take a journey through history and ‘tour’ some of the most outstanding collections on The Continent. The sojourn begins in Rome with a tour of the impressive Vatican Museums. Next stop is in Paris for a visit to the masterpieces at The Louvre! Next on the itinerary is an investigation of the treasures of The Prado in Madrid. While some of these iconic museums started as royal collections, others were formed to serve the public as educational resources. The course will investigate the history, collections, and impact of these popular cultural centers.

The Foundation for the Reading Public Museum is pleased to announce its most recent acquisition: a colorful impressionist painting by Aldro T. Hibbard (1886 – 1972), titled *Gloucester Harbor*. Museum Members and patrons selected the newest work of art to add to The Museum’s ever-growing Permanent Collection on Thursday, November 17, at the first Purchase Party held following the pandemic.

Aldro Hibbard was an American painter who adopted a “broken brush” technique inspired in part by the French Impressionists and Post-Impressionists. He was active in Vermont and Massachusetts, and was instrumental in founding the Rockport Art Colony

and the Rockport Art Association. His work can be found in the collections of The Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York, The Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts in Philadelphia, the Smithsonian American Art Museum in Washington, DC, The Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, and the National Academy of Design in New York. The work, which garnered the most votes, was presented by Collections Committee member Dr. Seth Rosenzweig.

During the lively event, Collections Committee members and curatorial staff presented five selections of oil paintings from art galleries in New York and Pennsylvania. Afterwards, attendees voted for their favorite with Levi Mengel Dollars. Other works in contention included: *Spring Along the Passaic River* by Richard Hayley Lever, presented by Collections Committee Chair Bill Sands; *Girl with Chin on Hand* by William Glackens presented by Collections Committee member Quality Quinn; *The Hammock, Conway* by William Glackens presented by Curatorial Assistant Hannah Wagner; and *Weathered Barn* by Luigi Lucioni, presented by Curator, Scott Schweigert.

Gloucester Harbor is currently on view in the Marcus Gallery of American Art on The Museum’s second floor.

DREAM TO FLY

At the Neag Planetarium starting in January



Have you ever dreamt you were flying?

Since the beginning of history, people have dreamed of flying. Tales of mythical dragon flights thrilled ancient dreamers. Storytellers wove airy fantasies of magic carpet rides. Leonardo da Vinci stoked the dreams of flight with his fantastic drawings and through his eyes, we learned to look to nature for the secrets of flight.

When the Montgolfier Brothers took to the skies in a balloon, the dream finally became reality. The Wright Brothers swept us up to the sky and started a revolution. It wasn't long before our immense and challenging dreams of soaring through the air became an everyday occurrence.

Dream To Fly is a poetic and touching story of aviation development through the ages. It presents the significant milestones on our route to conquering the skies — both in terms of technological breakthroughs, as well as our perceptions of flying itself.

The production team at the Heavens of Copernicus Planetarium use gorgeous full-dome visuals, a full orchestral score composed specifically for the show, and an elegant, tinge-of-the-exotic narration by one of Poland's leading stage and screen actors, Danuta Stenka, to make *Dream To Fly* an emotional, exceptional, and unforgettable experience. The attention to detail can be seen in the show's climactic WWII aerial battle; aviation enthusiasts will thrill to see how carefully the HOC animators modeled the actual aircraft flown in the dogfights.

Open your heart and mind to new ideas about flight, and learn how generations of dreamers pursued the ancient impulse that has taken us from the ground to the stars.

Loans from The Collection

In the planning stages of a major exhibition, curators scour collections worldwide to find items to bring together to tell a unique story. Several times a year, RPM is contacted by museums around the world asking to borrow a part of our collection to share with their audience. It is an honor when an item from our prized collection is requested as a loan, and a testament to the quality and importance of our collection on a global scale. Loans are arranged several years in advance, and a significant amount of time is spent creating a customized plan to ensure the safety of the artwork. When all the plans come to fruition, it is rewarding to see our objects displayed in a new setting, where, combined with the other material in the exhibition, it plays a vital part in conveying a narrative.

2023 will bring loans from RPM to museums in Ohio, South Carolina, and New York. William Washington's *General Marion and His Men at Pee Dee Swamp* will appear at the Florence County Museum in Florence, SC, in an exhibition exploring the depiction of General Francis Marion (1732 – 1795) and his militia during the Revolutionary War with interpretive emphasis on how Marion's activities in the Pee Dee region of South Carolina contributed to the folkloric "Marion mythos."

In autumn our famed and well-travelled painting, *The Laundress Ironing* by Edgar Degas, will adorn the walls of the Cleveland Museum of Art in a groundbreaking exhibition: *Degas and the Laundress: Women, Work, and Impressionism in Late Nineteenth-Century Paris*. The first of its kind, the exhibition will explore Degas' representation of Parisian laundresses. Visitors will have the opportunity to compare his depictions of the subject in paintings from museums and private collections across the world.

Closer to home, *The Singer*, also by Edgar Degas, will make its debut at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City in *Manet/Degas*, opening September 18, 2023. The exhibition will explore the often-tumultuous relationship between Edouard Manet and Edgar Degas as they worked as contemporaries defining modern painting in France. Their artistic styles overlapped and deviated from one another throughout their successful careers, allowing for strong comparisons between these famous Impressionists.

Holly Trostle Brigham: Mothers, Sisters and Daughters March 18 – June 4, 2023

This engaging exhibition brings together Philadelphia artist Holly Trostle Brigham's major works, including selections from several series, dating from the mid-1990s to the present. For the past three decades, Brigham has researched and interpreted the lives of women throughout time and has often used herself as the model. She draws her sources from mythology, art, religion, and theater.

Her earliest works in the exhibition explore goddesses from ancient Egypt and classical antiquity, such as Isis and Cybele, giving birth and succoring their children. Her first series, *Seven Sisters*, recovers the life stories of women artists from the Renaissance to the twentieth century, providing a rich personal iconography that includes flowers and butterflies. Brigham's next series, *Sacred Sisters* (also known as *Seven Sisters II*), depicts women of faith who also created poetry, music, painting, calligraphy, and ceramics. While painting the *Sacred Sisters*, Brigham also created a multimedia installation piece dedicated to the 12th-century German mystic nun Hildegard of Bingen that includes portraiture, memento mori, sculpted reliquaries, music, and a found object.

Both of the *Seven Sisters* series were further developed into limited edition, handmade artist books that have been collected by leading museums, universities, and special collection libraries, including the Smithsonian Institution, National Museum of Women in the Arts, and the Beinecke Library at Yale University. Brigham's most recent work introduces the viewer to women who were pioneers in the theater, dating back to Isabella Andreini in 16th-century Italy and France.
